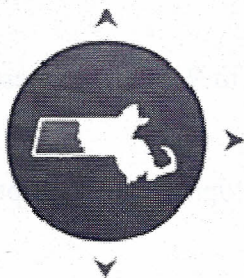

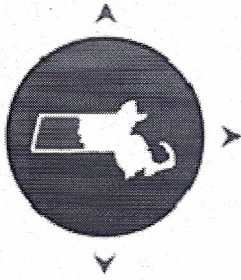
The Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Committee (WMRIC), previously known as the Interoperability Subcommittee of the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council (WRHSAC), requests formal representation from Hampshire County Control to serve as a voting member of the WMRIC Executive Committee.

The mission of WMRIC is to develop recommendations for policy and guidelines, identify technology, standards, and coordinate municipal, state, and private resources to assist/facilitate/improve/strengthen first responder interoperability in the region. WMRIC is committed to cooperatively addressing the challenge of communications interoperability among first responders in Western Massachusetts. As part of this ongoing effort, WMRIC recently formalized the way it operates by developing operational by-laws along with a contingency plan to address the possibility of decreased or eliminated homeland security funding.

The WMRIC Executive Committee is comprised of one member from each of the six system owners¹, six members at large, and a chairperson for a total of thirteen members. As a system owner, WMRIC requests that you appoint an individual who has authority to represent and vote on behalf of your system to serve on WMRIC Executive Committee. This person would also report back to you on the activities of WMRIC.

Please send us notification of your appointed individual by **Wednesday, December 10, 2015**. This individual will serve on the Executive Committee indefinitely or until either: the individual resigns; new representation is appointed by you; or the individual fails to attend the required

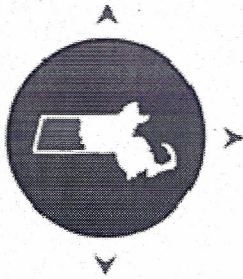

Grandfathered members were determined by reviewing meeting attendance from April 2014 through October 2014. Individuals who attended at least three meetings during that time are grandfathered in as Active Members as defined by the Bylaws of the Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Committee (WMRIC) adopted by the Western Region Homeland Security Advisory Council on Tuesday, October 21, 2014.



Plan to abide by WMRIC Bylaws adopted by WRHSAC on October 21, 2014.

Elections for the executive committee are to be held every year on an even year. The nominations should occur in November with elections occurring in December for a January start date. There are thirteen members to the executive committee: 6 system owners, 6 at-large, and one chairperson.

- For System Owner representation - Send letter to all system owners requesting appointment of formal representation to serve on executive committee. Appointments should be received no later than Wednesday, December 10th for formal acceptance at the December 16th meeting. (I recommend this timeline because there isn't enough time for systems to meet and have recommended appointments by the November 18th meeting).
- For the at-large members – recommend that we seek nominations from the subcommittee at the November 18th meeting. I can notify the subcommittee via email that nominations will be held at the next meeting. This introduces another challenge though, in that anyone not appointed by a system is supposed to submit in writing their request to serve as a member on WMRIC. The at-large members are then supposed to be elected from this membership pool. I think we could take a couple of steps here:
 - Simply grandfather all the current active participants of the subcommittee as members of WMRIC. I can review the attendance for the last six meetings and develop an active member list from that. Anyone who has attended at least 3 out of the last 6 meetings can be considered an active member, or
 - Ask all current participants to send us a letter of interest by Friday, November 14th so they can be documented as an active member.
- Hold elections for the at-large executive committee membership at the December 16th meeting. I recommend that this be by ballot from a list of nominees. This should be held after we receive and accept the appointments from the system owners, because there is the possibility that an active member may be appointed by a system owner thereby removing them from the need/eligibility to be chosen as an at-large member.

The way I read the bylaws is that the new executive committee won't have voting authority until the January meeting. So for the November and December meetings the current way of business still stands.

We will also be changing the heading of the agenda and sign-in sheets to reflect the new name of WMRIC, and try to make sure that we use the new name in all reference/correspondence related to WMRIC.

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Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Committee

Background

The following provides background on the Western Massachusetts Regional Homeland Security Council.

In 2004, the Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security developed five homeland security planning regions to receive Department of Homeland Security grant funds designated to support local governments and first responders.

Each region has a multi-disciplinary and multi-jurisdictional advisory council of first responders to ensure these funds meet the planning, organization, equipment, training, and exercise needs of the region. Funded activities must be regional in scope and must build or enhance capabilities that enable a region to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risks.

To further support this effort, the Western Regional Homeland Security Advisory Council created the Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Subcommittee (WMRIS) (also known as the Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Council - WMRIC) which has overseen the allocation of State Homeland Security Program funds addressing public safety communication needs in Western Massachusetts.

The goal of the subcommittee has been to achieve interoperable communication throughout Western Massachusetts. Additionally, it has strived to integrate the many disparate systems of the region; for example, the subcommittee administered funds across the region which supported the design, revamping, and enhancement of public safety communication systems. Specific systems include Franklin County Emergency Communication System (FCECS), Western Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council system (WMLEC), and the Berkshire County Emergency Communications Group (BCECG). Grant funds also enhanced the Hampshire County Fire District system and the Central Medical Emergency Direction (CMED) system.

Since its establishment, WMRIC has focused on improving communication infrastructure and equipment. The subcommittee has been limited in its ability to affect policy and procedure regarding interoperability governance, and in fact has operated without by-laws or a governance structure. The lack of a centralized government structure, since the state disbanded county government, affects regional planning. Further, the WRHSAC and WMRIC have not had the authority to enact procedural or policy matters in the region. Despite this lack of authority, state and municipal agencies have expected WRHSAC and its subcommittees to bear responsibility for encouraging municipal and private entities to adopt certain public safety communication policies and procedures, and to provide oversight and technical assistance on implementation of infrastructure improvements and the policies on use of the equipment.

The Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Committee (WMRIC) is committed to cooperatively addressing the challenge of communications interoperability among first responders in Western Massachusetts. As part of its effort, it is formalizing the way it operates by developing operational by-laws along with a contingency plan to address the possibility of decreased or eliminated homeland security funding.

Successful Building Blocks

Several efforts have established the ability of WMRIC to plan and implement interoperability projects.

Western Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council (WMLEC)

- WMLEC serves a consortium of police departments in Western Massachusetts along with federal, state, college/universities, and bordering CT public safety agencies.
- WMLEC charges user fees for those on the system.
- WMLEC UHF emergency communication system is used as a daily mutual aid system for police, fire and EMS departments in Hampden, Hampshire, Franklin, and Berkshire counties.
- WRHSAC has funded expansions of the WMLEC's radio network. Currently, WRHSAC has funded upgrades from the five-site system, to a ten site digital/analog dual mode system. The upgrade expanded system coverage into Berkshire County and addressed gaps in the Hampshire Hills region. The digital upgrade of the system also created links to the Massachusetts 800 system.

Berkshire County Simulcast

- Berkshire County Simulcast system serves the majority of public safety agencies in Berkshire County. Berkshire County Sheriff's Office dispatches the system.
- The system is supported through user fees.
- The WRHSAC has been assisting with the build out of Berkshire County's UHF/VHF Simulcast system over several years.
- Recent work upgraded the system from one simplex county fire channel to three channels . The project also added UHF/VHF simulcast and regional repeaters to an existing tower in Northern Berkshire County.

Franklin County Emergency Communications System

- The Franklin County Emergency Communications System (FCECS) serves the public safety agencies in Franklin County and is owned by the Franklin Regional Council of Governments.
- The system is supported through user fees.

- WRHSAC has funded the build out of the system from its original 1950's design of a three-tower VHF system to its current 14 tower duplex UHF simulcast system.
- A recent upgrade to the system was completed to address coverage gaps in Western Franklin County along the Rt. 202 corridor, particularly in the towns of Orange and Leverett.
- A new tower was built in Orange along with additional repeaters there and in Leverett.

Hampshire Hills

- Through the Hampshire Hills Interoperability Project, WRHSAC provided upgrades and build out to the Hampshire Automatic Mutual Aid Group (HAMAG) radio communications system.
- HAMAG serves fire and police departments in bordering hill towns located in Hampshire, Berkshire and Franklin County.
- The current project upgraded the equipment to a simulcast system at three of the system tower sites, and provided a direct link to Northampton Control / MSP Regional Dispatch to improve system resiliency.

Radio Cache

- Purchased twenty-eight Harris Unity XG-100P multi-band radios. Seven radios are located in four caches in the region, one in each county. The radios have the ability to be used on any public safety communication system in the region and are available for use by public safety agencies throughout Western Massachusetts.
- Purchased 168 UHF radios to create caches located strategically in the region.

Mobile Command Unit Radio Upgrade

- Upgrade the radios in the Incident Support Unit and two Field Communication Units (Field Comm / FC) in the region. These units can utilize the Massachusetts 800 trunked radio system to communicate throughout the region and the state if called on in a mutual aid situation.
- Recently the Commonwealth upgraded its entire communication system to a digital 800MHZ system. To communicate on the system, the Field Comm Unit radios were upgraded from analog to include digital.
- Upgraded to allow access to the Massachusetts State Police airwing video downlinks.
- Upgraded to provide voice recording for FC40 and FC50 and video smartboard with GIS software to one unit.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Western Massachusetts Regional Interoperability Council is to develop recommendations for policy and guidelines, identify technology, standards, and coordinate municipal, state, and private resources to assist/facilitate/improve/strengthen first responder interoperability in the region.

Vision

A radio communication system that is not hampered by terrain, distance, technology, or cost; enabling all first responders in the Western Massachusetts region the ability to communicate without interruption during routine and emergency situations.

WMRIC will:

- Focus on projects that are regional in scope and address interoperability from a multi-disciplined perspective.

- Develop standards to ensure radio system design and communications infrastructures support interoperability.
- Coordinate efforts in a manner that supports interoperability and

- communications plans developed at the state or federal level
- Promote best practices by continually researching advancement in interoperability and updating members on the findings.
- Encourage the use of shared and integrated systems that improve interoperability.
- Address single points of failure and other vulnerabilities
- Define policy for future development of systems funded through grant allocations.
- Foster collaboration between all levels of the membership to agree upon standards, spectrum planning, and technology purchases.
- Pursue coordination with adjacent states and agencies at all levels of government, businesses, and non-profit organizations.
- Seek grants for future projects.
- Participate in training and exercises designed to test and improve interoperable communications.

Area of Operation

The WMRIC region encompasses the counties of Berkshire, Franklin, Hampden, and Hampshire.

WMRIC - Subcommittee By-Laws

Name

This organization shall be known as the Western Massachusetts Region Interoperability Committee (WMRIC) and is a sub-committee of the Western Regional Homeland Security Advisory Council.

Purpose

The purpose of WMRIC is to oversee the use of funds and implementation of interoperability communication programs in western Massachusetts funded through the Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security.

Membership

Membership will consist of active membership. Active members may participate in discussion, however, the Executive Committee will vote on actions that WMRIC will take related to funding or projects.

Active Members

- The chair shall request member representation from each of the system owners¹.
- The chair shall seek participation from the Western Massachusetts Chiefs of Police, Western Massachusetts Fire Chiefs Association, Sheriff's Offices, hospitals, and other public safety agencies.
- Other interested individuals may request membership by submitting a letter of interest to the chair which then will be voted on by the Executive Committee.
- Active members may be representatives of any discipline.
- Active members may request items be placed on the agenda, and present before the Executive Committee.

Active members must attend a minimum of 50% of all meetings in a calendar year to retain their membership status. Failure to attend by an active member will result in a new representative requested from the system owner. Active members that do not attend the required number of meetings will be deleted from the membership list and will require a resubmittal of a letter of interest in order to rejoin.

The program manager from the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG) shall maintain the membership list and post it quarterly on the WHSRAC website.

¹ System owners include: Western Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council – WMLEC, Berkshire County Emergency Communications System – BCECS, Franklin County Emergency Communication Systems – FCECS, Hampshire County Control, Coordinated Medical Dispatch – CMED, and the Massachusetts State Police Communications.

Executive Committee

The Executive Committee will be comprised of one member from each of the six system owners, six members at large, and a chairperson for a total of thirteen members.

While the chairperson may be involved with a system, there still shall be a system representative on the Executive Committee in addition to the chairperson.

Six members of any combination of the disciplines will be considered as "at large" Executive Committee members, who will be nominated from and voted for by the active membership.

Powers

All Executive Committee members have the right to vote on all topics, proposal, financial motions, and specific items for presentation brought forward. A quorum of five must be present to vote.

Elections

Elections for the executive committee from the active membership shall be held every two years (on even years). Nominations will occur in November and elections will be held in December with a January start date for the term.

Chair

The Chair is appointed by the WRHSAC Chair. The Chairperson is an active member of the Executive Committee and as such, has voting privileges.

Duties of the Chairperson include:

- Providing leadership to the executive committee, who set policy and make recommendations for funding/project to the WHRSAC;
- Chairing meetings after developing the agenda;
- Helping guide and mediate committee actions with respect to organizational priorities and governance concerns;
- Achieving the organization's mission;
- Encouraging strategic planning;
- Discussing issues confronting the committee;
- Performing other responsibilities assigned by the executive committee and;
- Establishing a Vice Chairperson to act on behalf of the Chairperson in their absence.

Vacancies

Vacancies of an at large position will be filled by appointment² from the Chairperson within 30 days. Vacancies of the system owners will prompt the Chairperson to request a new representative within 30 days.

Meetings

Meetings will occur at least ten times per year. The length of the meeting will be determined by the Chairperson after setting the agenda.

The Chairperson will set the agenda for each meeting with input from the members and based on the needs of the WRHSAC. Agenda notices will be made available via email not less than 48 hours prior to meetings.

Topics, proposals, financial motions, and specific items for presentation to WMRIC will be placed on the agenda and discussed in open and collaborative manner by all attendees under control of the Chairperson and/or designees.

A recording of all members present will be kept using a sign-in sheet that will become part of the meeting minutes.

The Chairperson will lead discussions to gather information and input on agenda topics. Once the discussion is concluded, the Board may determine if a consensus is reached by polling the members in attendance. The poll will be a “yay or nay” voice vote unless the Board decides to conduct a formal vote.

After the poll, an Executive Committee member will make a formal motion, to be seconded by another Executive Committee member, after which the Executive Committee will take a formal vote and forward its recommendation to WRHSAC. Should the Executive Committee elect not to poll the membership, the motion process will be as set forth with the exception of the poll.

The program manager from the Franklin Regional Council of Governments (FRCOG) shall post polls of the active members, and the votes of the Executive Committee along with other meeting minutes within seven days of approval of the subcommittee.

Responsibilities

WMRIC will suggest to WRHSAC projects to fund and then oversee those projects. WMRIC will provide monthly updates to WRHSAC on funded projects and any policy matters that need to be addressed by WRHSAC. WMRIC will submit an annual regional interoperability plan to WRHSAC based on available funding and project needs.

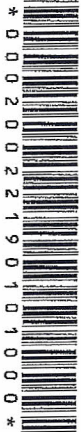
